Naplan is a valuable tool that can give useful insights into a student's performance, but individual reports should be interpreted with care as they reflect the student's performance on the day of testing. Well done to all grade 3 and grade 5 students who sat the tests. An information pamphlet is included which explains the changed testing and new proficiency standards which were introduced this year.

EVERY DAY COUNTS

If students miss school regularly, they miss out on learning the fundamental skills that will set them up for success in the later years of school. For some children missing school is more common and if a child misses a lot of school, it can be hard to keep up with schoolwork and friendships. If you're having attendance issues with your child, please let your classroom teacher know so we can work together to get your child to school every day.



ARRIVING TO SCHOOL ON TIME

We understand that sometimes situations beyond our control result in us being late. Arriving to school on time is ightarrow important for several reasons. When students arrive on time to school, they are relaxed and ready to learn. When students arrive late to school, they are rushed and often stressed, which can cause anxiety. Repeatedly arriving to class late means they may miss out on valuable learning.

\bigstar **Punctuality tips:**

 \star I. Schoolbag ready

To avoid forgetfulness and delays, pack the schoolbag the night before. This instils the habit of planning. $\frac{1}{2}$

2. <u>Clothes laid out ahead of time</u>. To prevent this from making your child late for school, get them into the habit of \bigstar preparing their clothes the night before. That way, they won't have to think, and they'll gain valuable minutes that can make all the difference.

3. Sufficient rest

 \bigstar Prepare your child for a good night sleep and avoid having electronic devices in their bedroom at night to avoid \star insomnia and possible distractions.


- 4. <u>Habit and routine</u> to make behaviours automatic, it's important to establish a routine that's repeated every $\frac{1}{2}$
 - morning; for example: Get up, eat breakfast, get cleaned up, get dressed, grab the schoolbag, and go outside.
- \bigstar 5. Scheduled times A good way to achieve this is to establish a scheduled time for each task; for example, dedicate twenty minutes to breakfast and move on to the next step even if it's not finished.

 \bigstar 6. <u>A reasonable margin</u> No matter how good your planning is, unforeseen events can always arise. Allow an extra 15 minutes.

ightarrow 7. Motivate your children to avoid being late for school. As an example, you can tell your child that if he/she is ready on time, he/she will be able to watch cartoons a while before leaving, or have extra time on the playground \bigstar before going to class. \bigstar


This is no easy task and requires a great deal of practice. Well done Trey on such an amazing achievement!



Schools Issuing Guidelines

Travel Passes for students in crisis

Purpose

This document should be used by schools in determining student eligibility for a pre-paid Travel Pass.

Travel Pass

Pre-paid Travel Passes make it possible for disadvantaged Victorians to use public transport to access vital services and to actively engage with the community.

Travel Passes are a paper 30-day pass available for both primary and secondary school students experiencing crisis who are at risk of disengaging from education.

This ensures they can continue to attend school, receive an education and participate in school activities, and access support services.

Schools can issue a Travel Pass for free to students in crisis primarily to travel to school, but also for other reasons, such as travelling to:

- a medical or rehabilitation appointment;
- a counselling session; or
- temporary or crisis accommodation.

Eligibility

Students are eligible for the program if they are experiencing:

- sudden financial hardship;
- family violence;
- substance abuse:
- family/relationship breakdowns; or
- homelessness; and
- are at risk of disengaging from education due to difficulty in accessing funds to use public transport to get to school.

Obtaining and Issuing a Travel Pass

Government schools can apply for Travel Passes through the State Schools' Relief online portal.

Upon receipt of the Travel Pass the school must hole punch the Travel Pass with the issuing date, month and year.

The Travel Pass:

- Is valid for 30 days commencing on the day of the month and year that has been hole punched.
- Is not valid for travel if more than one date, or if the day, month or year has not been hole punched.
- Can be validated for a future date.
- Cannot be reissued or exchanged.

Failure to correctly validate the Travel Pass could result in an infringement notice issued to the ticket holder.



Travelling with a Travel Pass

- A Travel Pass can be used on:
- bus, train and tram trips in metropolitan Melbourne (Zone 1 and 2);
- all regional town buses;
- PTV inter-town buses;
- V/Line coaches; and
- V/Line trains.

When passing through a staffed ticket barrier, students will need to show their Travel Pass to the barrier attendant. When travelling on a bus, students may need to show their Travel Pass to the driver.

Students need to carry their Travel Pass for the entire journey.

A Travel Pass should be treated like money - a lost or stolen Travel Pass cannot be replaced.

School's Responsibilities

The school must ensure:

- The school as a Travel Pass Issuer has procedures to satisfactorily document that a Travel Pass has been issued to an eligible student.
- All staff who issue a Travel Pass are aware of and follow the correct procedures for issuing Travel Passes, including the criteria for deeming who is eligible to receive a Travel Pass.
- All staff who issue a Travel Pass are responsible for assisting the school to facilitate an effective review of the issue and use of Travel Passes if required.
- All non-issued Travel Passes are kept in a secure location when not in use.
- Travel Passes are correctly validated by hole punching the Travel Pass with the issuing date, month and year.

Being a Safe Driver at School Crossings



- Drivers must not overtake a vehicle stopping/stopped at the School Crossing.
- Keep the School Crossing Clear. Do not stop your car on the crossing. Blocking the crossing is not only against the law, but also dangerous for everyone.
- Drivers must stop if a child or adult is about to cross or is crossing while flags are displayed, even if there is no Crossing Supervisor.
- Drivers must stop if a handheld "Stop" sign is being displayed.
- Drivers must proceed only when all children and adults, including the School Crossing Supervisor are clear of the crossing.
- Drivers must approach at a speed slow enough to stop safely, if necessary.
- Drivers should always watch out for children near schools.

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Getting children to school safely is everyone's job. Too many cars around schools at drop-off & pick-up times can make it more dangerous for children and hard to find a parking spot.

We can all work together to get everyone to school safely and on time.



Reduce car trips – one of these options may work for you

- Walk or ride to school.
- If your school has a Walk to School map, get a copy from the office.
- Park and walk. Park a little further away from school and enjoy a short walk avoiding traffic and parking pressure.
- Carpool with a friend. You can share the pick-up and drop-off with another parent.

Keep the Drop off Pick up Zone moving

- A Drop off Pick up Zone is a special place to quickly drop-off or pick-up your child when you use your car. You can only stay in the zone for 2 minutes each time and you must stay with your car.
- Move as far down the Drop off Pick up Zone as possible, don't stop at the start, this blocks the traffic behind you.
- Arrive at least three minutes after the school bell. No children are ready before this time. Don't arrive early and park in the Pick up Zone – remember, you can only stop here for 2 minutes.
- Change your pick-up or drop-off times to avoid the busiest peak times. For example: In the afternoon, arrive 5 minutes after the bell to pick-up your child and avoid the busy time.
- Child not there? Keep moving! Drive out of the zone and come back, don't park and wait for them.





No Parking

This no parking sign means that the area is a Drop off Pick up Zone. You cannot leave your vehicle unattended and you cannot stop for more than two minutes. The times may be a little different at your school, but the rules are the same. Fines can apply if the signs are not followed.

Be courteous and aware

- Follow signs, road rules and parking signs. They are there to keep our children safe.
- No stopping signs mean "Do not stop your vehicle for any reason". These areas must be kept clear for pedestrians and motorists.
- Do not park on nature strips or in front of driveways. This is very dangerous for children and other road users.
- Do not drop your children on the other side of the road and tell them to run across. Use a Drop off Pick up Zone or the safest crossing point, like a School Crossing or Pedestrian Crossing.
- Be extra careful and patient around schools.
- Slow down and be alert! Children can be unpredictable. Remain careful, especially at the busy morning and afternoon school times.

Use school crossings

- Casey's School Crossing Supervisors are trained to help children to cross the road safely.
- Use the school crossing. It is the safest place for children to cross the road.
- Keep the school crossing clear. Do not stop your car on the crossing. It is dangerous and illegal to block the crossing.



GETTING CHILDREN TO SCHOOL SAFELY IS EVERYONE'S JOB. Think before you park, drive, drop off and pick up. All children deserve to get to school safely.

Follow the signs And keep children safe



School Zone

The speed limit around schools is 40km on school days between 8.00am and 9.30am and 2.30pm and 4.00pm.

Slow down and keep children safe.



No Stopping

The no stopping sign means you cannot stop your vehicle for any purpose, no matter how short the time.



Bus Zone A bus zone is an area only for buses. You cannot stop there at all.



Never double park, it is illegal and dangerous

Double parking is stopping next to parked cars to pick up or let out children.

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
